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

FOUNDATION & YOUTH AWARD ... MARY LYKINS

Foundation

Another season for applying for ESA Foundation scholarships closed on February 1, 2023. The initial review of all application received should soon be accomplished. The next round of reviewers will reduce the number of applications for further review.

Scholarship winners will be notified in April. May if there are judges late in returning their reviews.

Dues are now \$40.00 per year. In 2022, email reminders to pay membership dues by December 31st were sent to members, chapters, councils, and other entities on December 1st and December 15th. The Headquarters staff takes a holiday break starting December 21st, so if you need additional help from a staff member to pay your dues, call before the office closes. Dues can also be paid, on-line or via mail. If mailing your dues, take into consideration the time it takes to get across country during the "Christmas season".

Please use the **Turnaround Funds** when disbursing your chapter funds. This is an easy way to support the Foundation. The turnaround funds donation form is its own form and is available on the contribution page of the ESAF website. Benefits and highlights include:

Rather than sending individual checks to one or more 501c3 charities, the individual sends one check to the Foundation indicating which charity is to receive what amount. The Foundation turns around this request and sends individual checks back to the person using the turnaround funds. Then the person sends the checks to the individual charities.

Benefit: Easier to document donations on your taxes (donations to one charity instead of multiples)

Item to remember: Checks are returned to the individual, not the charity, so the individual needs to send them on to the charity.

Note: In order to better track ESAF contributions, Headquarters is asking for Turnaround funds to be sent in a separate check from other ESA donations, i.e., dues, grant or endowment donations.

Outstanding Youth

The youth that apply for the Epsilon Sigma Alpha Outstanding Youth award are always amazing. This year unfortunately there were only two (2) students that forwarded packages to me. Both packages were z independently reviewed by three (3) different individuals from varied backgrounds.

All three reviewers unanimously chose Lauren Hinshaw. You may or may not remember that her brother won the Outstanding Youth Award in 2020. Like her brother Lauren is an outstanding student. Lauren is a senior at Brecksville-Broadview Heights High School. With a GPA of 4.176. Lauren's package has been forwarded to the International Council (IC) Outstanding Youth Award Chair for consideration at the IC level. If Lauren is the winner, I will be notified in May. Lauren's essay is presented for your appraisal.

The youth that apply but not selected for the Ohio State Council Outstanding Youth Award are all amazing students.





Lauren Hinshaw...Essay

To me, the definition of an outstanding individual is this: someone who values and exemplifies core values like integrity, a strong work ethic, humility, and consideration for others. Outstanding individuals aren't perfect, but they try.

What is integrity? First, it's when your words and your actions line up. Second, it's when you not only fulfill their promises, but you show prudence with your choices.

I have been identified by my peers, coaches, and teachers as someone who is reliable, dependable, disciplined, and respectful- components of integrity. Over the summer, I had the opportunity to travel to Daytona Beach Florida to help teach foster kids how to swim. Keeping an open mind "to see" all people instills gratitude and builds unity. An outstanding individual appreciates those differences and is known for loving people.

Finally, an outstanding individual is one that encourages and makes everyone around them a better version of themselves. They have a team player mindset. I believe my position as a goalkeeper has helped develop this quality over the years. As the last line of defense, I see the entire field and appreciate every position in front of me. I am able to command the field and anticipate changes that need to take place to maintain a stronghold. I have learned that words of affirmation and providing clear constructive feedback is most effective. At our state convention, I passed out envelopes with each chapter's totals for St Jude so far this year. Please remember to check your totals to make sure they are correct. If you find a discrepancy, please contact Deena Steele at HQ to let her know. The figures I sent you are from the St. Jude Coordinator's Report that Deena puts out.

Our Ohio State Fundraiser for St. Jude is going well, and I thank you all for your participation and support. Since I am soooo illiterate in social media, I do appreciate all of your patience and understanding at my lack of ability to so a stellar job, but I do want to recognize Mandy and Becka for all their help and support they have given me throughout the year, making this silent auction a successful endeavor.

We still have a few months to go, so keep those bids coming in!! As of March 1st, our totals raised so far is \$565.00.

Our Ohio Dream Home campaigns were a huge success again this past year. Cincinnati Home raised \$1.3 million and sold out in 5 weeks. The Cleveland Home raised \$2.5 million and sold out in less than 2 hours. Maybe one of these days, Shirley will reveal her secret as to how they sell out so quickly??? Come on Shirley... you can tell us.....we're all friends! HAHAHAH

The St. Jude walk/runs were also successful this year, with Cincinnati raising \$78,672.00, Cleveland raising \$97,447.00, and Columbus raising \$90,000.00.

The Cleveland Dream home for this year is well under way. Ticket sales started on Feb. 23rd and sold out in 81 minutes. Our Cincinnati Dream home ticket sales start April 7th. The home will be in Union Ky. Again, with 20,000 tickets to sell. 

A STORY ... TONYA CAMPBELL FROM SIGMA CHI

The Hayden & Crue project:

Today we'd like to introduce you to Tony, Nicole, Wayne and Kelsey.



Hi Tony, Nicole, Wayne and Kelsey. We'd love to learn more about how you got to where you are today. We found out we were pregnant in May of 2019. We were so excited to be starting a family. My first trimester was showing to be normal with no complications. Right at 13 weeks, entering into the 2nd trimester, I began to experience things that were contradicting to normal pregnancy symptoms. From that point on I was having to go to multiple doctors' appointments a week. Many ultrasounds were conducted, and while they could detect a bleed, the baby was still thriving. At week 16, even while experiencing scary pregnancy symptoms, we went to our appointment at Becoming Mom to find out the gender of our baby. We were ecstatic to find out that we were going to be adding a baby girl to our family. 3 short weeks later, our worries and nightmares became true. We found out that our baby girl's heartbeat was no longer detected. I was immediately admitted into Labor and Delivery and was induced to give birth. On September 1st, 2019, I gave birth to Hayden Rae Campbell. She weighed 4.8 oz and was 7 1/2 inches long.

Wayne and Kelsey Hambrick's Story: In 2019, we fell pregnant with our angel Crue. I quickly started showing signs of preeclampsia at about 20 weeks and had to be closely monitored by the Maternal Fetal Medicine doctors at UC Medical Center. By 24 weeks things turned for the worst, and I was hospitalized with severe preeclampsia for the final time. My blood pressure was continuing to rise, despite multiple medical interventions, and my brain was showing signs of swelling, leaving the team with no choice but to deliver. At just 24 weeks and 4 days, I had an emergency C-section. Crue Corbett Hambrick was born crying and full of life on December 9th, 2019. He weighed 1 lb. 6 oz and was 12 inches long. After battling multiple brain bleeds and NEC, he passed away from sepsis on December 18th, 2019. He gave us 9 beautiful days that we will cherish forever.

In March of 2020, we decided to start The Hayden & Crue Project. We are a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization dedicated to providing support to families on their unique journey through parenthood. This journey can include infertility, extended hospitalization, miscarriage, stillbirth, and infant/child loss. We are also working to give back to Labor and Delivery (L&D) and Newborn Intensive Care Unit (NICU) nurses in local hospitals. Our vision is to continue to work with local hospitals providing necessities for families in need. This can include emergency kits containing essential toiletry items as well as desired comfort items.

We are currently partnering with Good Samaritan Hospital

to develop the Angel Suite, which will provide families with a private room to spend time with their baby away from the Labor and Delivery Unit. This suite will bring comfort to parents who have lost the baby in the womb, will inevitably lose the baby after giving birth, or even for parents who plan to give their baby up for adoption. This space would be located on an overflow floor away from the Labor and Delivery Unit and would be designed to support these families during one of the hardest moments of their lives. This space will allow the parents to be away from the triggering sounds, equipment, and atmosphere that surrounds them in a typical L&D unit. The suite will have comforting items such as a rocking chair, books, refrigerator, larger bed for both parents, cleansing and dressing station containing infant clothes, and blankets for them to use if they choose to. There will also be a cuddle cot located in the room full time. The cuddle cot preserves the baby so that the family gets to spend adequate time and create memories before having to leave the hospital.

We are also working to give back to L&D and NICU nurses, as they are a key part of every family's journey, and we are so appreciative of the patience and care that they provide.

We all face challenges, but looking back, would you describe it as a relatively smooth road?

We both laughed while reading this question; the loss of a child is definitely not something that any parent wants to experience, no matter the amount of time spent here on earth. We both had to individually navigate through loss in our own ways but commonly found that we leaned upon each other a lot through the process. The first year was the hardest. We still have hard days; grief has a way to creep up on you when you least expect it. Sometimes all it takes is a familiar sound, memory, or photo to pop up and completely take you back to the hardest moments. We would have to say that milestones are also tough. When you lose a baby you lose a lifetime of celebrations. but we never stop celebrating and showing honor of what could have been.

Can you tell our readers more about what you do and what you think sets you apart from others? Tony- Tony works for a family-owned third party transportation company

known as Bridge Logistics. He is a team lead in sales, with five employees following his lead.

Wayne- Wayne is a marine

corps veteran. He now works as a lineman for Duke Energy.

Kelsey- Kelsey is a nurse manager at Beckett Springs Hospital in West Chester. Her background includes emergency nursing as well as psychiatric nursing.

Nicole- Nicole worked as a manager of multiple insurance agents. Now, she has the best job of all; a stay-at-home mom!
