
Do You Know: Established in 1970, the ESA Foundation is dedicated to the promotion of continuing education and to altruistic activities that make a positive difference in the world community. If you are 72 or older, you must take your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) this year. You can gift all or a portion of your RMD. Because this gift does not provide a charitable deduction on your income taxes, it is an ideal way for non-itemizers to reduce taxable income while providing support for the ESA Foundation. Contact your IRA administrator for more details and, when ready, reach out to ESA Headquarters for directions of how and where to send your check and/or electronic transfer. Plan ahead so your contribution gets credited prior to December 31st.





As we know and love Ohio and tour many local historic educational sites, it's interesting to note that there's an official **"Ohio Women in History Road Trip"** through various cities in Ohio outlined at Ohio's website <u>Ohio Women in History Road Trip | Official Travel & Tourism Website for Ohio</u>. Of course we can tour these neat sites throughout the year – not just March.

There is no doubt that women are changing the world in many positive ways. We, as members of ESA make a significant difference; we contribute an immeasurable level of service and fundraisers benefiting people in our community and around the world.

OSC Meeting – March 2024

At our OSC meeting on March 2nd, Alzheimer Assn (Greater Cinti) Kelsey Nihiser, Program Manager gave a presentation explaining the difference between Alzheimer's Disease and Dementia – see pictures attached. Dementia is an umbrella term for loss of memory and other cognitive abilities severe enough to interfere with daily activities. Alzheimer's being one disease under Dementia. Kelsey also reviewed the "10 early signs and symptoms of Alzheimer's and Dementia – see webpage for summary <u>https://www.alz.org/events/event_search?etid=2&cid=138</u> At our meeting, we also assembled 50 packages tailored for Alzheimer's care takers. Alzheimer Assn will be taking these packages to distribute at a care taker event in Middletown, OH.

She had a great time at Amy Gross's educational presentation of her experience walking 500 miles on the Camino Pilgrimage. Kim likes shopping, painting, traveling, hanging out with good friends and camping. She enjoys volunteering opportunities with Sigma Chi. Sounds like a good fit for ESA: Good friends. Good works. Good times.

Harmon House Museum (Lebanon OH) - February educational tour

For our February educational docent-led tour, we found a hidden gem - the **Harmon House Museum**, located in Lebanon, Ohio near the Golden Lamb historic restaurant. It houses an extensive collection of art and artifacts from the rich history of Southwest Ohio. The museum is housed in historic_Harmon Hall. Harmon Museum and Art Gallery covers four floors (over 77,000 sq. ft.) and houses four art galleries, prehistoric artifacts, Shaker artifacts and documents, a recreation of a 19th century town square, an extensive textile collection, and a research library. The newly renovated Archeological & Indigenous Peoples Exhibit contains an impressive display of relics, and fossils (trilobytes from 400-500 million years ago). Many of these historical artifacts were recovered from the Fort Ancient State Memorial Park (Oregonia -

It's similar to the Cincinnati Museum's display of the Ohio River riverboat and town shops in the 19th century.



- **1919** As a result, the election of 1922 delivered as a first, six women to Ohio's 85th General Assembly two to the state Senate Nettie Bromley Loughead of Hamilton County and Maude Comstock Waitt of Cuyahoga County and four women to the House of Representatives.
- Harriet Beecher-Stowe The novel is a fictionalized account of the pain slavery caused its victims, the struggles slaves endured to escape and travel on the Underground Railroad, and the triumph of escaping to freedom in the northern states or Canada. This book was written at a time when women did not have a right to vote, have legal rights, or the right to speak in public meetings. Uncle Tom's Cabin became an important part of the social fabric, and it is thought to have added wood to the fire that started the Civil War and led to the emancipation of southern slaves by President Abraham Lincoln in 1863. The Harriet Beecher-Stowe house in Cincinnati HARRIET BEECHER STOWE HOUSE Home (stowehousecincy.org) offers a tour that explores the deep significance of the Ohio River for Cincinnati's Underground Railroad and African American history of resistance, achievement, and leadership from the 1800s through the 20th century.
- **Northeast Ohioan Harriet Taylor Upton** led the suffrage movement from Trumbull County for several years in the early 20th century and helped relocate the national headquarters of the National American Woman Suffrage Association to her home in Warren in 1903 and then to the Trumbull County Courthouse in 1905. Under Upton's direction, the association grew into a well-organized force that finally achieved success in 1920, with the ratification of the 19th Amendment, guaranteeing women the right to vote.
